Words from Ken

The Olmstead Brothers Were Right!

In November 1910, Bishop James Atkins (one of the founders of Lake Junaluska) received a report from the Olmsted Brothers Landscape Architects firm. The report was from the sons of famed landscape architect Fredrick Law Olmsted, who designed Central Park and the Biltmore Estate. They had recently visited the future site of Lake Junaluska and had met with the engineer planning the construction of the Lake Junaluska Dam. The report is lengthy, with many suggestions for the planned assembly grounds. Below is an excerpt from their letter:

"We examined with great interest and satisfaction the picturesque and well-located lands which have been secured for the Assembly Grounds.....We feel that the lake is very essential to give the place a distinctive character and reputation such as will serve as a more powerful advertisement than almost anything else that could be done with a liberal expenditure of money.... A lake with beautiful landscape surroundings situated in the high mountains would inevitably be recognized as a rare and extremely attractive feature."

During the time this letter was written, the founders of Lake Junaluska were struggling with the cost of constructing the dam that forms Lake Junaluska. They were debating delaying the construction of the dam until later. The Olmsted's report made a compelling case for the dam and lake!

Over the past 110 years, their vision has been accurate. The lake and the beautifully landscaped common area are part of almost every experience on these sacred grounds. Seeing people walking, sitting on benches, or gathering with friends along the lakeshore is exciting. The open area around the lake also creates amazing vista points where the wonder of God's creation can easily be observed.

This winter, we will be taking steps to ensure the preservation of the lake through three significant projects. We will remove sediment from the west end of the lake, perform maintenance on the control gates that regulate the level of the lake, and conduct an engineering study on the part of the dam that extends to the south in front of the Lakemont Condominiums. On December 27th, we began lowering the lake to enable this work in January. Weather permitting, the lake should be low enough for work to begin by late January.

The level of the lake will be lower than it has been in recent years because of the work on the control gates. This means that the small dam, known as a cofferdam, will be visible just west of the dam. This smaller dam is designed to hold back the water while work is conducted on the primary dam.

The engineering study of the section of the dam near Lakemont Condominiums will include the use of ground-penetrating radar to determine the material used for the core of this section of the dam. Based on the outcomes of this study, a maintenance plan for this section of the dam will be created. This report will be an integral part of the comprehensive long-range plan for the dam being created by a special task force led by Chuck Lipp.

This work is being funded through charitable giving and funds appropriated in the NC State budget for these projects. To learn more about these projects and for updates on our progress, please visit lakejunaluska.com/drawdown

They were right; the lake and the beautiful landscape surroundings are among our best physical features and an integral part of our being a place of Christian hospitality where lives are transformed through renewal of soul, mind, and body.
