The next Junaluskan's Travel Group trip is set for Fri. Jul 18. Travelers will meet at 9a at the Bethea Welcome Center to check in and form carpools. The first stop will be at Saluda, NC, the top point of the Saluda Grade, the rail line completed in 1878 which was the steepest climb east of the Rockies. The M. A. Pace General Store (opened in 1899) will be the primary destination in Saluda that morning along with other spots on the quaint main drag. Continuing into South Carolina, lunch will be at Strawberry Hill USA at their wonderful restaurant followed produce shopping (especially SC peaches this time of year) at their Produce Shed the Famous Colley Family Farm. Next is more history at the nearby Cowpens National Battlefield Park where a battle helped turn the tide in the Revolutionary War against England. On the trip back home, some may again want to stop in Saluda (it's quite near I-26) at the Historic Depot and Museum (only open from 1-4 p).

### Keeping the Dam Bridge Safe

The bridge over the Lake Junaluska dam holds a special place in the hearts of our community and visitors. For some, it's the nostalgic clickety-clack sound of the wooden planks. For others, it symbolizes the promise of what lies on the other side – whether that's morning walks, peaceful views, or special gatherings.

The bridge is often a common point of discussion. One lane bridges are a novelty in 2025, and so is our simple signage asking people to "be courteous" when crossing the bridge. Below is some information about how the bridge is constructed that may help explain the weight limit and protocol when crossing.

In 2018, we refurbished the bridge with charitable gifts, including many from the Junaluskans. The bridge is constructed with steel beams supported by concrete buttresses and surfaced with wood planks and steel plates. The distance between the buttresses is referred to as "span distance or span." The bridge features 17 spans, each capable of safely supporting a vehicle weighing up to 6,000 pounds (Gross Vehicle Weight). The spans vary in length and can't be seen from the top of the bridge. This means that, technically, more than one vehicle can be on the bridge at a time, as long as each vehicle does not weigh more than 6,000 pounds GVW and no more than one vehicle is on each span at a time.

Because the bridge has only one lane, we request that drivers alternate with oncoming traffic. While the bridge can handle more than one vehicle at a time (as explained above), alternating helps assure equal use of the bridge and a more respectful experience for everyone.

Occasionally, we receive feedback that a large vehicle was spotted crossing the bridge. Although the weight limit is marked with signs, we are unsure whether the signs are being ignored or simply not noticed.

Keeping large vehicles off the bridge is one of our top priorities. Because of this, and to help people understand our protocols for the bridge, Junior Woody (Lake Junaluska's Public Works Director) is exploring updated signage to:

- 1. Communicate the weight limit per vehicle
- 2. Encourage vehicles to alternate with oncoming traffic.
- 3. Clarify that when there is no oncoming traffic, vehicles should maintain a distance of 60 feet or four car lengths apart.

He is also exploring an entryway that limits tall vehicles from entering the bridge.

Ultimately, if drivers follow the posted weight limit and are courteous to one another by taking turns with oncoming traffic, then the bridge is safe and protected. Thank you to everyone who has reached out with questions and concerns. Protecting our dam bridge is a shared responsibility, and with your help, we can continue to enjoy it safely for years to come.
