NOMADS at Lake Junaluska

The NOMADS organization began in 1988 in the Rio Grande Valley of Texas. United Methodists from Illinois, Iowa and Indiana were wintering in Texas. Wishing to do more in retirement, they approached local United Methodist churches and offered their services. The first year there were 24 members who completed five projects in Texas and Oklahoma. Membership grew, and by 2001, NOMADS incorporated and became an organization under the General Board of Global Ministries. NOMADS contracted a full-time program administrator and started offering summer/fall projects in addition to winter/spring projects. Currently, the NOMADS offer about 175 projects each year and have around 700 active members. NOMADS, an acronym which stands for Nomads On a Mission in Divine Service, travel in RVs for part of the year, donating over 110,000 hours of volunteer labor yearly. Their projects include working on requested services and helping recovery following major climatic disasters.

Lake Junaluska has had a long relationship with the Nomad organization and is the beneficiary of their wonderful volunteer work. They are scheduled to be at LJA March 25 through April 11 and August 19 through September 5 in 2024. The Junaluskans board has planned a potluck style salad and sandwich lunch on April 9 at the Lambuth Inn dining room and will include the NOMADS as our guests. This would give the Junaluskans the opportunity to meet and thank these generous volunteers for their years of service at LJA. Junaluskans Activities in March

Join us for Vespers at Memorial Chapel, at **4:00pm on Tuesday, March 5**. Don Kirkindoll, Director of Music and Worship and Worship Arts at Waynesville First United Methodist Church will share his faith journey.

The Junaluskans will gather in the Harrell Center Auditorium at 10:00am on Wednesday, March 6th. This month's presentation is entitled *Managing Stormwater Runoff Or, Where Did my Mulch Go?* What can property owners do to help conserve their soil cover and prevent rainwater runoff? This will be addressed by our speaker, Duane Vanhook, District Director, Haywood Soil and Water Conservation District, at the 10 am Wednesday, March 6 Junaluskans meeting in the Harrell Center auditorium. Duane will present ideas and information about stormwater and its relation to transporting litter and sediment. At the lake we see how sediment builds up and we witness mulch and gravel washed out by rain, especially heavy rains, from our yards and driveways. Understanding the force of water to transport litter and soil and what measures we can take to prevent that while encouraging water infiltration and storage will help us better manage our landscapes. Log Successfully Removed from Gate of the Dam

For several months, one of the gates on the dam has not been operating correctly. Lake Junaluska employees responsible for maintaining the dam first discovered that a large obstruction was

apparently the cause of this issue. The gates are approximately 3 feet wide by 5 feet tall and are controlled by a manual mechanical system that is part of the dam's original construction in the early 1910s. Initial suspicions were that the obstruction in question was a large tree or log. Those suspicions were later confirmed. Efforts to dislodge the log over the spring and summer were unsuccessful, and the decision was made to wait until the winter drawdown to remove the obstruction.

On Tuesday, February 27, professionals from our dam engineering firm, RCF Construction, Crestline Global and staff from Lake Junaluska. convened to address the situation. Thankfully, the log removal proceeded smoothly and, at this time, we do not believe there is any residual damage to the gate. This effort concludes the work scheduled for this season's drawdown, and we have begun refilling the lake. If we receive some rainfall, it should be full well before Easter.

A grapple barge was used to remove the log which

measured about 17 feet in length and 2-2 1/2 feet in diameter and was located approximately 10 feet underwater at the base of the dam. Once the barge and other factors were in place, the actual log removal took about 10 minutes.

Adam King and his brother Philip King own Crestline Global, a marine cleanup and recovery company located in Canton, which also builds its barges at its Canton site. The barge used on Tuesday was specially built to recover trees, houses, cars and boats. There are very few in the country, and the chance of having one next door to Lake Junaluska was very slim.

When Brian Aldridge (Lake Junaluska's Dam operator) contacted the King brothers, they jumped at the chance to remove the obstruction from the dam because of their family history with Lake Junaluska. They have enjoyed the lake for years and are grateful that it's open to the public to use and enjoy. We deeply appreciate the way in which they have given back to Lake Junaluska and Haywood County in such a meaningful way.

We are fortunate for the expertise of dam engineer John Garner, Mackie McKay, Brian Aldridge and Junior Woody who led the efforts to prevent the lake from draining this summer and worked alongside the other professionals during the entire process. Chuck Lipp has been instrumental in connecting us with additional engineering professionals to consult with on this issue.

Plans are already underway to place a "trash rack" in front of the gates to help prevent this from happening again in the future. This work and other improvements to the dam will take place over the next several years. Thank you for your prayers and support over the past several months and for helping us every day to live into our mission to be a place of Christian hospitality where lives are transformed by renewal of soul, mind and body.
