Worship at Lake Junaluska



For the past 110 years, worship services have been among our most important traditions. They are one of the many things that bring us together at Lake Junaluska. I always love seeing people put aside their differences and focus on being together in worship. You probably agree that there would likely be fewer issues in the world if we spent more time worshiping together.

Worship takes place throughout the year in almost every location on the grounds, from the stage of Stuart Auditorium

during the WNC Annual Conference to the foot of the cross when youth gather for jubilant celebrations heard throughout the grounds. Three aspects of worship at Lake Junaluska that make us unique are our outdoor worship locations, the diversity of denominations or churches that use these grounds, and the amazing volunteers within our community who make the Summer Worship Series possible.

We have a variety of outdoor spaces that are perfect for worship at Lake Junaluska. Our 16 gardens are favored spots for intimate worship amid God's creation. The Stuart Spring area is a great example of this, with its tall trees providing shade on the hottest of summer days and cool mountain water bubbling out of the ground. The Amphitheater, Inspiration Point and the lakeside tent are also popular locations with amazing vistas.

We have seen the return of our large denominational conferences this year, including the Church of the Brethren who will be here September 1-9. While these conferences have been smaller than before 2020, we have attracted many new churches or groups to use our facilities. This summer, we also saw events become more ecumenical. This was very apparent during the M28 youth events, which included United Methodist and Global Methodist churches praising God together.

Our Summer Worship Series this year brought many of the leading voices from around the country. The series was organized and led by a group of volunteers, including Dan Martin and KC Armstrong, Margaret Amick, Bishop Ken Carter and Pam Carter, Paul Davenport, Bill and Grace Gattis, Sandy Giles, Nancy and Rush Hood, Gene and Jody Lipscomb, Dan Martin, Jimmy Pennel, Pat Poag, Pat and Sylvia Russel, Linda and Walter Smith, Ashley Crowder Stanley, Paul and Judy Starnes, Joe Taft, and Sarah and Hardy Tippet. These volunteers were supported by several staff members, including Mike Huber, Betsy Schuessler, Margo Turman and Woody White. Each Sunday provided a powerful message and, throughout the following

weeks, we had a chance to know these leading theologians through interactive sessions that engaged the mind and stretched the soul.

The Transformational Power of Charitable Giving

Growing up in church in the 1980s, our Sunday School teachers used to incentivize the memorization of scripture– a gold star on a chart that hung proudly in the Sunday School room, a piece or two of candy to eat during "big church" or maybe a bookmark to place in our Bibles. They would break down the Bible passages into easy-to-remember phrases: "Love one another"

(1 John 3:23), "You are the light of the world (Matthew 5:14), and "God loves a cheerful giver" (2 Corinthians 9:7).

I worked hard to earn the gold stars and I still have one of those bookmarks in my Bible to remind me of my home church. But now when I read scripture as an adult, I marvel at how I know a snippet of a verse but may have never paid much attention to the rest of the passage. Take 2 Corinthians 9:7-8 for example:

Each of you must give as you have made up your mind, not regretfully or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver. And God is able to provide you with every blessing in abundance, so that by always having enough of everything, you may share abundantly in every good work.

Working in the Office of Development, I have the privilege of seeing this passage lived out each day here at Lake Junaluska. Gifts are given in support of the Lake's mission and ministry with a cheerful heart by charitable supporters because they have recognized the abundance of God's goodness in their lives, and they want to share that abundance with others. I am grateful for the tender stories that you share with us- stories of how you met your spouse here, how you felt called to ministry while on a retreat, how you reconciled with a loved one after many hours of rocking on a front porch, and how you feel God's reassuring presence in the sunrise or sunset. You give not for your own benefit; rather, you give because you want others to encounter the goodness of God.

In an article earlier this year, I mentioned that there are 3 vital components of a healthy fundraising program for nonprofit ministries: Annual Giving, Planned Giving and Major Giving. And, I shared that we are blessed to have cheerful givers faithfully supporting all three areas. Another name for Major Giving is *Transformational Giving* because they are gifts that can truly transform a place or space.

You may have noticed the impact of transformational giving lately as you've walked the grounds— a new paved walkway between the Terrace Hotel and the Warren Center with a stone vista point overlooking the lake, a new stone raised bed along the Rose Walk, new screens and projectors in Stuart Auditorium and a refurbished back wall inside of Stuart. Each of these projects have been made possible through the cheerful giving of charitable supporters who love this place and want to share that love with others. The gifts not only transform the grounds, they also transform the experiences had by those who visit– providing opportunities for renewal of soul, mind and body year round.

Learn about Hemlock Protection and Restoration

On **Wednesday, September 13** from 10 to 11:30 a.m., join the Hemlock Restoration Initiative for a walk around the Corneille Bryan Native Garden in Lake Junaluska to learn about the efforts to protect hemlocks from Hemlock Woolly Adelgid (HWA). Discussions will cover hemlock trees in Western North Carolina ecosystems and how HWA is threatening them. This informational walk will give participants 'on the ground' experience with identifying North Carolina's two native hemlocks, assessing tree health and deciding how best to manage hemlocks on their own properties. They will also discuss what governments and conservation organizations are doing to restore hemlocks to long term health in NC, highlight an integrated

strategy for hemlock conservation, and let folks know how they can get involved in native hemlock conservation.
